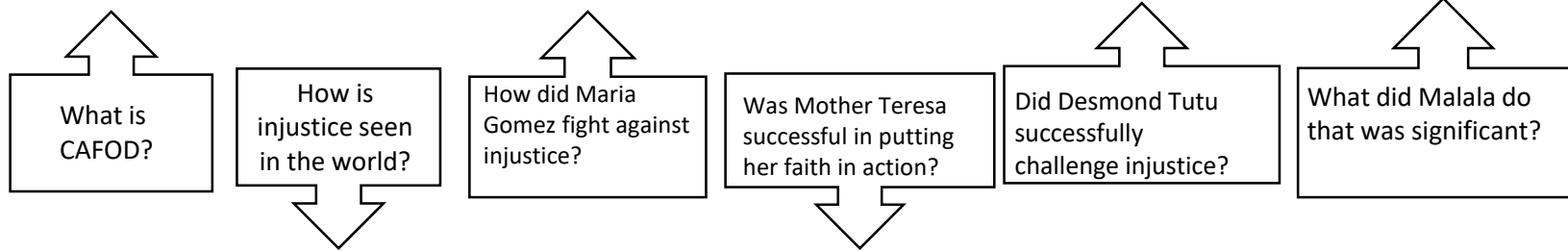
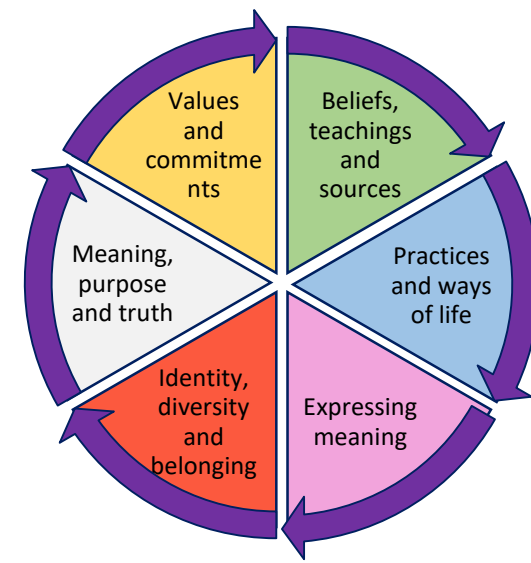

What does CAFOD stand for?

Catholic Agency For Overseas Development

Focuses on long-term development but also responds to emergencies.

Speaks out on behalf of poor communities. Promotes social justice.

- "The Golden Rule" – Treat others as you would like to be treated.

-Treat everyone equally and show compassion.

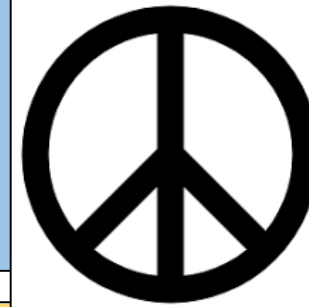
-Believe that they should leave the world a better place.

El Salvador is a small country in Central America.

In the 1980s El Salvador was ravaged by a bitter civil war.

It was ruled by very powerful families who were a small and wealthy elite.

They dominated the government and the economy, and the overwhelming majority of the population, many of whom lived - and continue to live - in poverty and squalor.



Maria Gomez worked to bring justice in El Salvador. This cross was painted and dedicated to her.



Mother Teresa was a Catholic missionary, who dedicated her life to helping people in She believed that what she was doing was directly helping Jesus, she believed the '*poorest of the poor*' were Christ in disguise. Mother Teresa intended to show love to people who had been abandoned and left on the streets to die in terrible poverty. She received the Nobel Peace Prize.

Archbishop Desmond Tutu

was the first Black Anglican Bishop in South Africa. He dedicated his life to speaking out against injustice and campaigning for the end of Apartheid, which he believed was an abuse of human rights. He was guided by his Christian faith. He was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.



Malala Yousafazi

In 2011 the Taliban banned girls in Pakistan from been educated.... Malala was shot on her school bus in north western Swat by Taliban gunmen for the "crime" of promoting girls' education. After recovering she continued to speak out in favour of equal rights and justice. She was given the Nobel Peace prize for her work.
